Introduction to RUHX

Breast Unit Extension – Completed!



RUHX is proud, and delighted, to share the news that the Breast Unit Extension has been completed on time. It is now fully operational and receiving patients.

This £1million project, funded by our charity, is one of our many crowning achievements in 2022. As ever, we remain extremely grateful to the committed support of our fundraising community, super supporters, friends and partners. The improvements, so far, include:

Improved Patient Experience

1

New-and-improved Waiting Area

This new waiting area now facilitates an even better patient experience. A patient who arrives at their consultation less flustered and stressed is more likely to be able to engage with their clinician in a more positive manner with less fear and apprehension.

2

Dedicated Treatment Room

Now even more suitable for wound dressing change, removal of surgical drains and for minor procedures. Prior to the extension we did not have such a facility.

3

Improved Consultation and Examination Areas

Patients, and their relatives, can now be seen in a much more practical and eye-pleasing consultation suite, with space and chairs for everyone to be seated, with better lighting and air conditioning. These feature benefit a more conducive environment for difficult and lengthy discussions about cancer diagnosis and treatment planning.

Improved Patient Flow

With the addition of the treatment room and a better clinical space, we have now also greatly improved patient flow and reduced the amount of time that patients are required to stay in the waiting area before being seen by a doctor or nurse.

Improved Environment for Clinical Staff

1

Dedicated Treatment Room

This larger space can offer better quality of care and wound management, delivered by clinical staff.

2

A Consultation Suite

This space allows staff to deliver a better quality consultation, which reduces stress and unhappiness for clinical staff. Improved ventilation, air conditioning and light significantly lessens the impact of stress and fatigue.



3

Breast Care Nursing Centre

Breast cancer patients require full-time nursing support during and after the active phase of their treatment. A new dedicated Breast Care area to facilitate and coordinate greater assistance is essential for higher quality ongoing patient support.

4

Increase in Wellbeing

The improvements to the clinical areas and garden have helped to considerably improve the amount of space, patient flow, and light and air quality. These changes have helped ensure the staff feel more valued, while reducing stress, fatigue and mood.

5

Workstation for Healthcare Assistants

There is now a dedicated desk and work station for our healthcare assistants. These staff members are vital for face to face patient contact and for the smooth running of our clinics.

To the Rescue: Mental Health First Aiders

Vital training course to assist staff spot early signs of mental ill health

Taking care of our RUH team is an extremely important aspect of our work. As we kickstart our recovery from the Covid pandemic, a range of strategic wellbeing initiatives are already underway by senior hospital staff, and our Employee Assistant Programme. First up, is the Mental Health First Aiders training course.

So far, 200 team members have received the MHFA training course, delivered by local charity, Bath Mind, with more than 100 staff already initiated here at the RUH. The course empowers employees to detect early signs of mental ill health in others, and themselves, and encourages them to break down any barriers, listen in a non-judgemental way, and signpost co-workers towards recovery.

Helping our staff to help each other

Karl Lee, a Security Coordinator at the RUH, shares his thoughts on becoming one of the first MHFA's:

"I was given the opportunity to become a MHFA in my previous employment, and I went into it with a very open mind. What I didn't expect was this

overwhelming desire to become an advocate to this amazing cause.

More Help for Our RUH Staff

Becoming a MHFA gave me a new skillset, a toolbox to identify early signs and symptoms, and to quickly identify concerns within friends, family and colleagues. When the pandemic first hit, this new learning helped in abundance: I was able to support RUH staff who had to work through the intense stress and strains that Covid brought to families in everyday life. I was a person that they could turn to and release that stress. Some used it merely as a vent, and felt happy that they had managed to express. For others, it had a huge impact on theirs, and their family members, mental health.

Some weren't aware of how much the pandemic actually affected them, but by detecting those signs, and listening to how they were coping with the pandemic, the symptoms on show were clear signs of a mental health crisis. Thanks to MHFA training, I was able to confidently ask them difficult questions and point them in the right direction to gain the support they needed. The course has made me become a better leader, for sure.

It allows me to tap into my inner qualities, qualities that exist in all of us – compassion, empathy, understanding, sympathy and kindness. We all have these amazing qualities, some use them more than most. But to have these qualities, heightened by the MHFA course and adapting them to my everyday process, work or home, is an amazing gift.

I was fortunate to bring this skillset to the RUH. I now feel so empowered, I want to help and assist anywhere I can. I have this burning passion to do some good. It's very cliché to say, I know, but I want to make a difference. And, at the RUH, being surrounded by amazingly likeminded and decent human beings, has only confirmed that decision.

MHFA's are important network within our staff culture, they open a web of guidance and support from the ground up. In my opinion, everyone that carries any superiority in their role should complete the MHFA course. Who's next? 🙌

As our loved ones get older, their bodies can become frail, and for some, this will increase risk when coming into a new environment, such as a hospital. Without home comforts to rely on, time spent in hospital can be highly stressful for elderly patients and their loved ones. Our new Older Persons Assessment Unit (OPAU) at the RUH now offers that little bit extra support at the right time.

Even More Assistance

Working to comfort the most frail with more support than ever before, the OPAU has been specifically designed to assess, treat, and send extremely frail patients home as quickly as possible. The unit drastically reduces unnecessary hours spent in A&E and can considerably decrease the risk of falling, a huge concern for the RUH.

Even More Help

As new as the OPAU is, our charity is always looking to improve services for our patients. The OPAU constantly requires better, and more, specialist equipment to support frail patients safety and comfort while in hospital.

Currently, the OPAU is seeking to replace the existing standard trolley beds that are too high off the ground for many elderly patients. With specially designed trolley beds, that will support mobility for our most frail patients, the OPAU can go even further in improving patients care during their stay. We'd love your help.

Can you support RUHX to raise £34,000 to provide seven specialised trolleys?

These will go a long way to provide extra exceptional healthcare for our most vulnerable patients.

Walk-and-talk and support your local hospital with a challenging (but rewarding!) summer stroll down the beautiful Kennet & Avon Canal. This is an extra extraordinary opportunity to raise funds for great causes... and keep fit at the same time!

Fundraisers participating in the **Walk for Life** can tackle the 26.2 mile-marathon path or take the 10-mile route. The choice is yours!

"My late wife Val had a couple of 10-day stays in the RUH, with complications from the MS she lived with for nearly 45 years. The second stay, sadly, ended with her death seven years ago, but throughout both stays she couldn't have asked for better or more

sympathetic care. She had nothing but the highest praise for all the RUH staff, and for her treatment – they deserve our help. And I can't think of a better place to start than the Walk of Life!"

Karlie Evans, Events and Community Manager of the Walk for Life, can't wait for this year's walk. "We are really looking forward to the Walk of Life in 2022 – its seventeenth year! With the help of thousands of walkers, we will ensure local hospitals continue to provide extraordinary healthcare for everyone.

'Topping out' Ceremony at the RUH marks a high point in Dyson Cancer Centre Construction

This March, a 'topping out' ceremony was held at the RUH to mark the completion of the frame of the new Cancer Centre. Scheduled to open Autumn 2023, the building will provide a cancer services hub for more than half a million cancer patients in the South West.

Building a Better Environment for All

"This is a wonderful milestone in our journey towards a new cancer centre for our community," Cara Charles-Barks, Chief Executive of the RUH said at the ceremony. "After all the years of planning and preparation and the generous support of the people of the South West, and beyond, it has been amazing to see this new building start to take shape on site. Since we broke ground in July 2021 the new centre has gradually emerged from behind the hoardings until we have now reached the highest point.

"We're really excited about the way our Dyson Cancer Centre will help us transform the care we can provide for patients and families, and the outstanding environment it will

provide for our dedicated staff, "Cara Charles-Barks told the crowd. "It will be a nurturing and therapeutic environment where patients and their loved ones can receive all the support they need in one purpose-built centre."

Health and Social Care Secretary Sajid Javid, who grew up in nearby Bristol, also spoke at the ceremony: "This new cancer centre will help us treat hundreds of thousands of patients in the South West and improve our care capacity. As part of our 10-Year Cancer Plan, we will focus on rapid diagnosis and innovative treatments to benefit millions of patients across the country and save more lives."

Extra Care for our Cancer Community

On the day, RUH representatives were joined by colleagues from NHS England, NHS Improvement and the Department of Health and Social Care, as well as key donors and fundraisers, including Jacky Medlock of the Medlock Charitable Trust, and representatives from The James Dyson Foundation, RUHX and Macmillan Cancer Care as well as construction partner, Kier.

RUH Chair Alison Ryan, and RUH Oncology and Haematology Matron, Caroline Gilleece, were transported to the top of the new three-storey centre by crane for the ceremonial laying of the final piece of concrete for the roof. All attendees were invited to make their mark on one of the new interior walls of the centre, to honour the day.

Thanks to the support of our local community, RUHX raised £10m towards the new centre, including a generous donation of £4m from The James Dyson Foundation and £1m from the Medlock Charitable Trust. Rhyannon Boyd, RUHX's Head of Fundraising gave a heartfelt speech: "It's been fantastic to see the building works progressing, as we edge closer to the completion of the Dyson Cancer Centre, and we are extremely appreciative to all of our 8,500 supporters who have helped to raise an incredible amount of funds – it's an extraordinary achievement."

A Hub to call Home

One of the key features of the new centre, said Richard Pugh, Macmillan Head of Partnerships Wales and South West, is the specially-designed Macmillan Wellbeing Hub:



The Hub will be a non-clinical, calming space, offering practical and emotional support to people living with cancer. It will be there for everyone – from people with cancer, and their families, to their carers, It will help them every step of the way through cancer from diagnosis, during treatment, in recovery, and at the end of life.

Construction partner Kier have continued to keep the Dyson Cancer Centre on schedule, despite harsh winter weather conditions. "The Dyson Cancer Centre 'topping out' is an important milestone as it means we are one step closer to delivering this vital new healthcare facility that will serve people in the South West," said David Snell, Strategic Healthcare Director at Kier Regional Building Western & Wales. "We are using our extensive skill and experience, as well as working with local supply chain partners, to realise the collective ambitions of all which is to provide first-class amenities to patients."

Located next to the main RUH entrance, the Cancer Centre will unite the majority of the RUH's cancer services, including research teams, under one roof. 📍

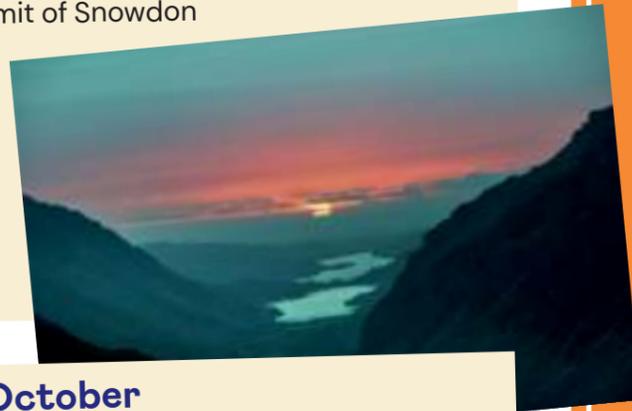

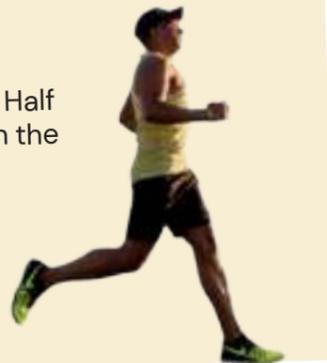

From cheering runners on at the Bath Half, to running one of our GoodNess stops at the Walk of Life, there are lots of roles you could help with at one of our charity events.

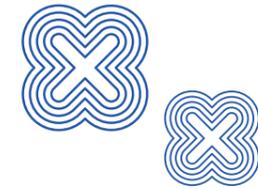

A Day in the Life

Osteoporosis and Fracture Liaison Service



Funded by RUH, the Osteoporosis and Fracture Liaison Service provides extra-exceptional care to patients in need. Specialist Osteoporosis Nurse, Louise Maine, shares with us the importance of her role and what the job entails.

Over to you, Louise...

"My typical work day starts at 8am. I catch-up on emails to see if there are letters to send out to patients. **The Fracture Liaison Service** identifies people over the age of 50, who have had a low trauma fracture with the aim of preventing them having secondary fractures.

When these have been identified, my colleague will send out letters to GPs, highlighting that we've identified a patient. A lot of the patients will be referred back in for DEXA scans (bone density scan). When they've had the scan, a report then gets sent out to the GPs to say whether treatment is recommended.

At the four-month stage, we follow up with a questionnaire. I look through these questionnaires and then formulate a letter from there. These letters will either be sent to the GP, or direct to the patient, depending on whether or not they're taking medication.

Extra Lifelines

Another big part of my role is taking advice line calls. Previously, I've spent three years at the Royal Osteoporosis Society as a helpline nurse, so a lot of the calls that come in are fairly typical of the questions that a lot of people are asking around the country.

We get people phoning because they've been identified by the Fracture Liaison Service, and they've received some of our questionnaires.



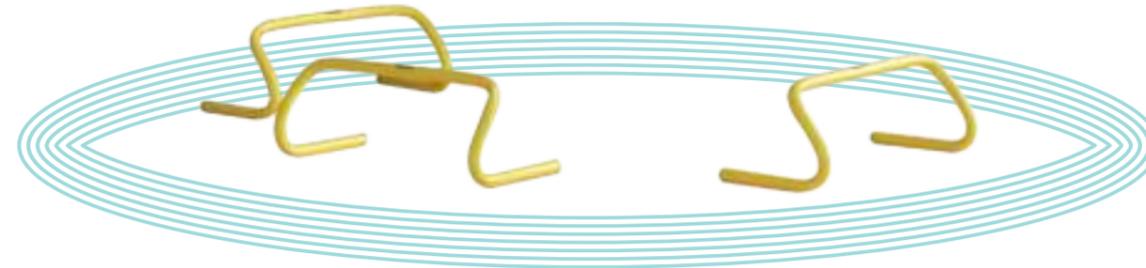
My role as Specialist Osteoporosis Nurse is to help develop the Fracture Liaison Service to better bridge the gap between primary and secondary care and support GPs with additional assistance with their decisions, as well as be there for the patients when they need us the most.

It prompts them to phone up and ask a few more questions about why they have been identified. It's nice to be able to go through this in detail with patients on the phone to discuss their results, discuss medication and encourage them to stay on their treatments. Getting that information out to them early on is a real key point and knowing that they've got this service to phone if they have got a problem is a great help."

I have no doubt at all that the **Fracture Liaison Service** will be of huge benefit to the osteoporosis specialist team at the RUH, as well as the patients who are treated there. I'm honoured to be part of the service. 📧

Gina Sargeant, Head of Therapies and AHP Lead at the RUH, and Holly Vestaskew, Administrator for Therapies and the Admin Team Lead, took time out of their busy schedules to tell us about the extra exciting new project funded by RUHX.

Treatment That Matters

A collective of 14 professions coming together across the Trust, ranging from dietitians to occupational therapists, physiotherapists to radiographers, and speech and language therapists, Allied Health Professions (AHPs) are often unsung hospital heroes. The AHPs aim is to deliver the right assistance at the right time, and supply the right kit for any patient's need, whether they are being treated in the hospital or out in the community. Gina manages and supports the members, with Holly

supporting the Outpatients Team for Clinics, scheduling appointments for the team, ordering and purchasing equipment, and allocating the right space so staff can see their patients with ease.

"We are based in the Brownsword Therapies Centre and the Royal National Hospital for Rheumatic Diseases (RNHRD); there are a mix of services and a lot of AHP outpatients," Gina told us. "All the inpatient AHP teams also have a home here as well, so it's a very busy building, but it's also a very positive, patient friendly space too."

Equipment That Cures

A range of equipment, including a lung ultrasound (lets physiotherapists quickly and easily assess critically ill patients by helping to diagnose many lung conditions and avoid the need to place a patient on a ventilator), has

recently been funded by the RUHX charity. An Indirect Calorimetry has also been procured through the charity. This device will allow dietitians to accurately determine patients' nutritional needs in a non-invasive way. It is considered critical for ill patients as it measures the air that they breathe out and informs medical professionals of the metabolic rate required for their dietetic needs.

It isn't just medical machines that saves lives. I.T. equipment, computer software and digital physio devices have also revolutionised the way patients receive treatment and drastically improve their experience by providing state-of-the-art assistance to patients who are undergoing musculoskeletal rehabilitation.

The Gift of Recovery

To date, the AHP project has kindly been funded by a large number of

Community eco-garden

On-site serenity for patients and staff

RUHX are delighted to be working in close collaboration with colleagues across the Emergency Department to create a specially-designed eco-garden on the hospital grounds, an ideal space to increase the emotional wellbeing of staff, patients and visitors.

More than an English garden

It has been widely proven that access to green space and a connection to nature significantly boosts better mental wellbeing by decreasing anxiety and depression, as well as calming the senses. As we all know, the Covid-19 pandemic has spiked the stress and anxiety levels for medical staff due to the immense pressure placed on the hospital. This idyllic outdoor sanctuary will introduce a well-deserved headspace for staff away from indoor pressures, and offers visitors a calming and soothing surrounding that encourages reflection and mindfulness.

In addition to being a relaxing retreat, the eco-garden also invites staff to engage in forest gardening techniques, a low maintenance style of gardening and offers the opportunity to grow plants and food in a self-sustaining space. Staff can also use the garden for events and celebrations.

A Safe Space for All

Access to the garden is for patients and visitors too. The hospital plans to use 'green prescribing', which encourages patients to spend as much time outdoors as possible, to improve their mental health wellbeing.

"We believe that we need to rekindle our connection with nature and the sense of wellbeing this provides, announced Nickie Jakeman, ED Consultant and eco-garden project lead, "and to reinvigorate a sense of community with people and the planet around us."

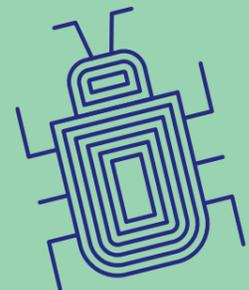
